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APPLIED BEHAVIORAL CONCEPTS ATTENDS THE P.L.A.Y. PROJECT CONFERENCE SPONSORED BY THE AUTISM SOCIETY

Carol Vancil, Suzanne Roten and Kim Cantrell traveled to Montgomery to attend the P.L.A.Y. Project Conference. The Conference by Dr. Rick Solomon, a Developmental Pediatrician, presented current information based on Stanley Greenspan's "Floortime" work with children on the autism spectrum.

The conference was sponsored by Blue Cross Blue Shield, Easter Seals and the Autism Society at the Montgomery Fine Arts Museum.

"Carol was asked by Maura Edwards (SLP) if we would like to attend. Since we do so much incidental teaching and inclusion in the classrooms, I was looking forward

to hearing about the new research they are publishing," said Kim Cantrell, B.S.

P.L.A.Y. Project was created by Richard Solomon M.D., and is based on the DIR® (Developmental, Individualized, Relationship-based) theory of Stanley Greenspan M.D.,

The P.L.A.Y. Project recommends many of the same components as the traditional Applied Behavior Analysis specifically; early and intensive intervention, low student teacher ratio of no more than 1:2, reinforcing (engaging) interactions and goal driven play.

"It is reassuring that so much of what we do here at Applied Behavioral Concepts is recommended by so many of the

other practitioners in the field." said Carol Vancil, BCBA. "We always insure that our children meet their goals in an effective way through a variety of learning modalities and remain confident in our methodology."

Attending the conference has spawned some fresh ideas in including play and new ways to use sensory input as a reinforcer.

This one-day workshop focused on the developmental theories behind Greenspan's work and the resulting DIR Theory. While there was mention made of research to be published, it was not presented in the conference.

YOGA AND FITNESS IN AUTISM

At the ALABA Conference (Alabama Association of Behavior Analysts) October 2007, one of the breakout sessions focused on yoga for children diagnosed with an ASD. Applied Behavioral Concepts, has been working for several months with a nationally certified fitness instructor to provide this service.

In addition, are in the process of implementing a fitness program to supplement the work of physical and occupational therapy, for our children at the Premier facilities. Additionally, DVD's will be made available to families interested in these techniques in our home and out of town programs.

"We have such a wonderful facility to provide gross motor activities. We have access to the playground

daily." said Carol Vancil, BCBA. "We have been able to teach children how to climb stairs and ladders. We have taught several children to ride tricycles. The playground also has two soccer goals, a jungle gym and a sandbox for sensory play available every day. If it is rainy, cold, or too hot, we play organized games in the gym like Simon Says, or the summer camp favorite, Duck, Duck Goose."

"We feel adding yoga class will provide children with a new opportunity to improve movement and balance" says Suzanne Roten, BA, "This is just another tool we can use to aid children with autism in physical development." So far the response has been positive from teachers, parents, and children alike. Applied Behavioral Concepts offered few classes during summer camp for the group of younger chil-

dren. "Our instructor was really excited and encouraged by the response from the children." said Carol Vancil, BCBA. "He was able to do more poses than he thought he would be able to do."

Breaking the movements down into a story helped the children move from one pose to the next. Mixing the typical peer models into the classes will allow modeling to occur for all children with developmental delays of all types.

"We are excited to be able to offer additional services to meet the needs of all the children." said Carol Vancil, BCBA.
